TEXTS, READING AIDS, GRAMMARS

Lexicity: <http://lexicity.com/language/greek/>

A very helpful “clearing house” site with hundreds of links to online Greek dictionaries, grammars, charts and other aids, texts, and workbooks. If you’re trying to find it, it’s probably here.

Includes a number of PDFs of public-domain Greek primers, dictionaries, grammars, and readers. The Greek prose composition books (esp. North & Hillard) are extremely helpful. Worth perusing.

Perseus: <http://www.perseus.tufts.edu/hopper/morph>

Perseus provides many services for readers of classical languages. The above link takes you to the site’s most helpful feature, the Greek Word Study Tool, which allows you to parse-out unfamiliar vocabulary. N.B., it’s very easy to become reliant on Perseus as a crutch, so watch out. The site also hosts numerous digital editions of commentaries.

Society for Biblical Literature Greek New Testament: <http://sblgnt.com/>

Entirely free to download Greek New Testament with apparatus criticus. It’s free and easy to use and search. Available in multiple formats. Includes a free version of an interlinear NT with the Lexham translation.

DICTIONARIES AND LEXICA

Thesaurus Linguae Graecae Online LSJ: <http://stephanus.tlg.uci.edu/lcj/#eid=1&context=lsj>

Online edition of the Liddell, Scott, and Jones dictionary (and the easiest to use). Do note that the dictionary is primarily geared toward Classical Greek texts and usage, but is nonetheless helpful for learning to read New Testament Greek. The TLG also has a helpful list of Unicode Greek fonts for those who want to type in Greek. Full access to texts is limited to subscribers.

An off-line program that allows you to search the LSJ for definitions. Designed to work with the TLG and PHI Greek and Latin corpus, but can be used strictly as a dictionary/morphological tool. Requires use of a Unicode keyboard.
